

RECTOR'S REPORT

2020 will be a year none of us will soon forget. I accepted the call to serve as your Rector in January, and then visited for a weekend in February. By the middle of March, the state was on a stay-at-home order, the Preschool was closed, and worship and programming moved online. This created a financial crisis for the parish, but due to the Vestry's diligence and Jane's superb leadership as Treasurer, a PPP loan was secured, and I was able to begin my ministry with you at the end of April as planned. What did not go as planned was my family's relocation to San Diego. After careful discernment and prayer, it was obvious that it made the most sense to remain in Sacramento until the church's budget could rebound and the future is more certain. It was a heartbreaking choice, as my family was prepared mentally and practically to move. Still, we were grateful that everyone was willing to press ahead and be patient as we look for the pandemic to subside.

Thus, I immediately had to figure out how to do ministry through the internet (and phone and mail). John Mark and I worked hard to find a way to do worship online that would be spiritually moving and accessible. It took several months, but we eventually found a system that works (at least most of the time!). Our "views" on Facebook and YouTube have been steady if not even growing throughout the year. These are hard metrics to measure, since a "view" doesn't necessarily mean someone watched the entire service. 'Live views' are another metric but also doesn't tell the whole story because there can be more than one person watching on a screen (like in my household, 5 people=1 live view). Suffice it to say, that we know hundreds of people are seeing our services each week, and that is exciting.

In May, I launched a few weekly formation opportunities: A Bible Study, a Prayer Group, and a Friday night Fellowship Hour after John Mark's Music hour. Each of these were wonderful and helped me get to know people in the parish. I also began offering Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, and Compline midweek on Facebook live. I launched the "Regather Task Force" in late May to study how we might allow for in person worship and events as coronavirus cases decreased. This led to the formation of the Small Group Worship ministry, which allows us to group people of similar age and risk-assessments together to receive Eucharist from Licensed Eucharistic Visitors once a month. This ministry started in late September and several groups were able to meet once or more before the cases skyrocketed, causing the Bishop to suspend in person worship once again in December.

In the Fall, I focused on building the Preschool Chapel program using Zoom. Due to regulations, no one can enter the classrooms, so we have come up with a way that I can be live with the students, sing songs, share a bible story, and pray together each week. I offer chapel three times each Wednesday (once for each class). John Mark, Fr. Wayne, Joy Sanders, and Debby have been awesome partners with me in this ministry, providing videos of songs and stories for me to use with the children. I have also been attending the Preschool PAC meetings, which allows me to get to know a few of the parents. These are all connections and relationships I hope to grow once we move past the pandemic, in order to strengthen the bridge between the church and the Preschool community.

I have been so impressed with Elaine and the Sunday School teachers! In the spring, they put together video lessons for the children each week, and then in the fall, they launched a live Sunday School on Zoom and engaged a new curriculum. As a parent, I have been so grateful that my children have a live connection with the teachers and are getting spiritual formation each week once again. Elaine has also connected our youth with the Diocesan Youth Collaborative, which gives the teens a ministry space dedicated to them. I have appreciated the creativity and help Elaine, Frances, and Leslie have brought all year long with thinking and planning for how to incorporate children into our online services. It has been so fun to work with them and to continue to build our ministry to children, youth, and families.

The Stewardship Campaign, "Creating Sacred Spaces," was an incredible success! I have so enjoyed working with Chris, Roseann, and Shirley and the entire Stewardship Committee. We had to truly think outside the box, and reimagine how to do the campaign under the circumstances and restrictions. I also loved being able to read "An Altar in the World" together as a parish, and hope that it helped us all to think about how we can bring spirituality into our daily lives. But truly, the way the congregation came together to support the work of the church through pledging has been inspiring. And this has not necessarily been the case for churches across the country, so this is something to greatly celebrate!

One of the most valuable things I've done is the Listening Campaign. Through it, I was able to spend thirty minutes (or more!) with over 75 of our parishioners. I asked 4 questions: 1) Tell me about yourself, 2) Tell me what brought you to St. David's? 3) Why do you stay at St. David's? and 4) What are your hopes and dreams for the church? I learned so much about people's lives, families, careers, ministries, and why St. David's is important to them. The stories I heard helped me understand a lot about this community and where God is calling us as a church. I'm so grateful to everyone who took part in this project!

It has been a year of learning new things and doing things that were previously thought to be impossible. I am so proud of the way so many parishioners took up new technology and learned to use these various platforms in order to communicate and connect. I, too, have had a steep learning curve, and it has – at times – felt overwhelming. I am also proud of the ways the community rallied to reach out to those who can't connect through technology, by organizing the Care Callers, and Rob burning DVDs of the service to send to people each week, for example. Treena also prints bulletins and my sermon to send to those who don't have DVD players. It has been a herculean task to keep the community together through this time of physical distancing, but the creativity and efforts everyone has made has been truly inspirational and indicates the deep and abiding love this church has for one another.

Looking ahead to 2021, uncertainty continues to be the order of the day. Experts predict the pandemic is likely to worsen and it may be another full year before we can gather together in church as we are accustomed to doing. The vaccine is here, yet it will take time to get everyone vaccinated and protected against the virus. While it is truly incredible the way the church has weathered the beginning of the pandemic financially, without a crystal ball it is hard to know when everything will rebound economically, and we can reach a level of stability once again. We are planning (hoping, praying!) to proceed with moving to San Diego this summer. I hope there will come a time between now and then where I can start flying back and forth, as I had planned to do last year, to be present there in person. Yet, if I learned anything at all last year, it's that in a pandemic, we really need to take it one day at a time. We have hopes and dreams, yes, and we anxiously await the time when this pandemic is in the rearview mirror. But until that moment comes, this era demands a level of flexibility and creativity that we aren't necessarily used to having to live by.

Thus, this year, we will continue doing what we have learned to do: keep one another safe, utilize technology for worship, programs, and fellowship, reach out to those who can't connect through technology, and make tentative plans for what our ministry will be post-pandemic. To that end, I am deeply grateful to the Vestry and Bishop Susan for helping us institute a Task Force to work with a consultant the bishop has appointed, Deacon Nancy Holland, to study our ministries, finances, and the opportunities that exist as we move into the new future post-Covid. Their work, along with the leadership of the Vestry and the Staff, will set us up to come out of this crisis strongly, and with a vision of mission and ministry to carry us forward for the next decade or more.

I am so grateful to all of you, for hanging in with me in this very strange arrangement we found ourselves in. I don't know anyone else who has been a rector of a church from 500 miles away, and I don't think anyone could have believed we would be able to do so much together in this way. And yet, here we are! I can't say enough good things about the staff: Treena, Karen, and John Mark are truly gifts from God, and the parish is blessed to have them. I have been blessed to work alongside them this year and I look forward to continuing to build upon the working relationships we all have. I also am indebted to Anne, our fearless

Senior Warden, who has been a supportive, loving, wise presence throughout so many challenges this year. I'm also thankful that Joy Wolf has agreed to be the next Senior Warden, and I look forward to working with her this year. Our Jr. Warden, Loral, and Treasurer, Jane, round out an incredible Executive Team who have all been so generous with their time and talents to help build up St. David's under tremendous odds. The entire Vestry – Kathy, Jamie, Rob, Katie, and Debby have worked so hard all year to provide leadership and stability. 2020 was a hard year, and not how any of us wanted to begin my ministry with you, but I have been blessed by all of you and the way you came together to love and support one another and me and my family, throughout it all. Good things are in store for St. David's in 2021, and I am very much looking forward to being with you for it!

Labyrinth Ministry

During 2020 we started out the year with our usual practice of hosting special labyrinth walks for the parish



and others in our community. Instead of our annual New Year's Eve labyrinth walk on December 31, 2019, we had one on New Year's Day 2020, followed by a service and reception. Many people indicated they liked the idea of a daytime walk and they thought it was a great way to start the new year. During Preschool Chapel time, the children were introduced to the labyrinth and invited to walk it. They had a lively time exploring the meandering path of the labyrinth. Daughters of the King from throughout the diocese walked the labyrinth in March as part of their Diocesan Lenten Quiet Day, an annual event that the St. David's DOK chapter hosted. The

Reverend Becky Tinnon led the retreat and she told the participants about ancient spiritual practices that are still relevant today, including walking the labyrinth.

In addition to these special labyrinth walks, many parishioners from St. David's and others from the community walked the labyrinth on their own. During normal times, people are free to walk the labyrinth anytime, seven days a week, except when a special program is going on there. However, during this pandemic the church campus, including the labyrinth, is closed to the public except for the preschool students and staff, but hopefully this situation will change before too long.

Walking the labyrinth is a form of walking meditation. As you walk you can pray for help, guidance, or healing—or just open yourself up to the leading of the Holy Spirit. Because the process of walking engages both sides of the brain, it can stimulate creativity or problem solving. For most people it brings a sense of peace and tranquility. It can be walked alone or in groups. Walking with others can foster a sense of being in community with other people on the path. It has been said that whatever happens on the labyrinth is a metaphor for what is going on in our lives.

There is a bench next to the labyrinth that provides a special place for people to sit and meditate before their walk or to reflect quietly after their walk as they listen to God's guidance. The library has books on the labyrinth and a DVD called "Rediscovering the Labyrinth" so people can learn about the labyrinth and various ways it can be used.

Inviting people to walk the labyrinth is one of many ways that we welcome people to St. David's. We've listed our labyrinth on a "Labyrinth Locator" on the Internet, indicating that people are welcome to walk it any time. This prompts some people to come to St. David's to experience the labyrinth. Others hear about it through e-mails, flyers, the Diocesan e-news, social media, other publicity or word of mouth.

The labyrinth often appeals to people who are on a spiritual quest but not necessarily inclined to attend a church service. Sometimes it's a first step before they decide to come to church. We've received some very positive comments from people outside our parish who have been drawn to the labyrinth.

The Labyrinth Ministry provides an opportunity to reach out to the broader community, serving as a means for evangelism. It can also help guide seekers on their spiritual quest. At our scheduled events we've provided food and hospitality. Anyone who is interested in supporting this outreach ministry is invited to join the Labyrinth Ministry to help plan, publicize, facilitate, and host future labyrinth events. There is also an opportunity to serve as a retreat leader for retreats that include a labyrinth walk. There's much more that could be done with this unique spiritual tool if we had the volunteers and resources to help the Labyrinth Ministry grow.

St. David's Music Ministry

2020 was certainly a memorable year. Because of the pandemic, everything in music is done differently. Pastor Jocelynn's assistance in organizing and leading cannot be overstated.

Since the pandemic, I have had weekly meetings with Pastor Jocelynn, and I attend meetings of the Vestry. All of the music for Sunday worship services is pre-recorded; about 80 songs and hymns have been recorded, with singing by myself and others, as well as many instrumental pieces. We have had over a dozen people add their voices or instruments to the music in this way. We also have regular choir practice, where we log in to a meeting and practice new and old songs.

During the summer, on Fridays I hosted a short weekly informal piano hour, which was viewed by around 60-100 people. We also have a fundraising site where people have donated to the music program by downloading the keyboard music from the services.

We also mourn the passing of two very special choir members, Jeff Watkins and Terry Garate. Their beautiful voices still resound in our heart.

ended our program due to Covid restrictions.

On September 13th, we started Sunday School lessons with zoom. We used the WHIRL program. It included Opening Prayer, a video presentation, lesson, and closing prayer. The program follows our liturgical schedule. We started at 10 and ended by 10:30 so we could join our online church service. We have children who read or served as intercessors for our online church services. We had 5 regular attendees.

Youth (11-18yrs.) started the year out meeting on Sundays during the Chapel time until March when Covid shut us down. In September, we were invited to join Christ Church, Coronado and St. Paul's Cathedral Youth

Formation on Tuesday evenings, from 6:30-7:30 pm. It's been fun joining with other middle and high school students on zoom. We did the Reform program. Our youth have also participated as readers for church services. The EDSD Youth Collaborative provided other opportunities & activities, online, for our youth. Distance has not deterred two of our youth, currently living in Sacramento, from participating in weekly programs. We did celebrate the high school graduation, virtually, for one of our youth. We had 3 youth.

Our children and youth participated in videos, during church services. They welcomed our Bishop's visit. On Christmas Eve, they passed a candle to each other during *Silent Night*, as examples.

Junior Daughters of the King (Jr. DOK)

The girls in Jr. Daughters of the King had another year doing prayer, study, and service projects. The year started out in the usual fashion but after March many of their usual activities had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. They've missed doing some of their favorite activities such as the annual Dog Wash and the annual beach party at Mission Bay where the girls go kayaking. Hopefully they can do those things together again when things open up. But even during the challenges of the pandemic, the girls have managed to stay positive and focus on helping others through their monthly service projects.

The year started out with their usual January activity of cooking and serving a meal to the Interfaith Shelter guests staying at St. David's, and they entertained the children staying there. Then they joined a JR. DOKchapter from another church for their meeting and service project. They also joined other youth doing landscape improvement at the Marston House on Martin Luther King Day of Interfaith Service. On January 19th Reagan was baptized and formally admitted as a member of the Jr. DOK. That was a very special day for all of us. In February the girls made Valentines for the preschool children, staff and the seniors in the Senior Center. They also made Valentine cookies and cards for some parishioners who had been ill or unable to attend church.

During their monthly gatherings in the first few months of the year, the girls learned about prayer, the Holy Spirit who guides and strengthens them, and ways to share Christ's message and love. In this way they grew in their faith, helped others and deepened their friendships with one another. Unfortunately, after March everything changed and they were not able to gather together for fun or service.

But even while things have been shut down, they've had monthly meetings on zoom which have helped them stay in touch. In one meeting they celebrated Reagan's birthday (which happened to be on that day) and Anna played the guitar for us. Evie participated in a national JR. DOKmeeting with girls from all over the country.

One of the projects the girls did during the pandemic was painting rocks with inspirational words or messages such as Hope, Peace, and Love. These rocks were then scattered in their neighborhoods for people to find as a way to brighten their days. Another service project was writing a card to each of the preschool children and their families to let them know the girls were thinking of them and praying for them. The girls also made some cards for Pastor Jocelynn's family.

Angelina has been doing her college classes from home the last several months so we have enjoyed having her with us at our zoom gatherings and she has helped with our service projects. Unfortunately, we had to say goodbye to Reagan when she moved out of state this summer. We miss her energy and enthusiasm but we hope we can stay in touch.

This fall the girls did several service projects that involved baking. Fortunately, baking is something they enjoy and they can do it from home during this time when they are not able to meet in person. They baked cookies that were distributed at the drive-by Consecration event at church. Then they baked goodies for some

parishioners who live alone or who have health issues. They also made treats and cards for the church and preschool staff for Christmas.

Through their service projects the girls are learning the satisfaction of helping others as they follow Christ's teaching and spread God's love. Their dedication and hard work are inspiring. It's wonderful to see girls who are willing to take time out of their own schedules to provide service for others. As they follow the JR. DOKmotto, they're learning that "they can't do everything—but they can do something," and the service they do helps others in their community and brings joy to them. Hopefully these years of study, prayer, and service will help the girls in their spiritual formation and inspire them to a life of service and concern for others.

JR. DOKis open to all the girls in our parish age seven and older, as well as baptized girls from outside the parish. It provides opportunities for girls to experience the joy of belonging to a group in which love of God and other people is the framework for their gatherings and ministries to others. 

PASTORAL MINISTRIES





Centering Prayer is a simple method of silent meditation. It involves "opening oneself to an awareness of the abiding presence of God within us." It emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God. It is a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Christ--but it is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer. The transformative effects of Centering Prayer hopefully show up in us as we gradually become more peaceful and less reactive and we start to see the fruits of the spirit manifested in our lives.

Our Centering Prayer Group at St. David's meets every Tuesday morning at 10:30 for about an hour. We've been meeting regularly ever since we had a Centering Prayer Introductory Workshop at St. David's in July 2018. In normal times we meet in person in the church library but during the pandemic we are meeting on zoom. Our group includes St. David's parishioners and others from the community.

Coming to the Centering Prayer group each week is an inspiring experience—both for the time of meditation and for the discussion that follows. We start with an opening prayer and then we have a 20 minute period of silence while we do Centering Prayer. This is followed by a group discussion sparked by a video we watch or part of a book we read together to further our spiritual growth and deepen our contemplative practice. We just finished reading a book by Richard Rohr called *The Naked Now: Learning to See as the Mystics See*.

Our group is part of Contemplative Outreach of San Diego. It is the local chapter of Contemplative Outreach Ltd., an international ecumenical organization. It supports Centering Prayer groups at many churches throughout the area. There is extensive information about Centering Prayer available on its website (www.contemplativeoutreachsd.org) and the website of Contemplative Outreach of North San Diego (CONSD.org). These two local groups put on retreats each year relating to contemplative practices.

Contemplative prayer was practiced by Jesus and the early church. Somehow it got lost along the way but it was rediscovered by the desert fathers and mothers, the monasteries, and various mystics. It has had renewed popularity in recent decades, partly inspired by Thomas Merton. The Christian method of Centering Prayer that we follow was developed by Father Thomas Keating to make it readily accessible to anyone. It is a very simple method for inner silent prayer.

Daughters of the King (DOK)



The Daughters of the King chapter at St. David's is part of a women's international spirituality group founded in 1885. Our focus is on prayer, service, evangelism, and continuous study to further our spiritual growth. We seek to know Jesus, to make him known to others, and to reflect God's love in all we do. We reaffirm our Baptismal covenant and we agree to follow a Rule of Prayer and a Rule of Service, dedicating ourselves to spreading Christ's message and strengthening the spiritual life of our parish.

In ordinary times we get together monthly but during the pandemic we gathered on zoom. Our gatherings are usually in the evening on the first Monday of the month. We spend our time on prayer, fellowship, and discussion of the spiritual book we are currently studying.

Early in the year we chose <u>Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps</u> by Richard Rohr for our study book. In that book, Rohr draws a close connection between the Gospel and many of the 12 step principles. He shows how the Gospel principles in the Twelve Steps can free us from any addiction—ranging from a dependence on alcohol or drugs to the less visible addictions that we all have. Rohr suggests that when we learn to identify our addiction, embrace our brokenness, and surrender to God, we can bring healing to ourselves and our world.

During Lent we gathered to walk the Stations of the Cross in the sanctuary, utilizing a guide called "Mary's Way of the Cross." Using this booklet, we saw through the eyes of Jesus 'mother what he was experiencing on the way to Calvary.

Our last in-person gathering right before things shut down was a Lenten Quiet Day. This was an inspiring Diocesan-wide DOK event hosted by our St. David's chapter on March 7. The Rev. Becky Tinnon led this retreat. It was called: "Be Still and Know That I Am God" and it focused on spiritual practices from the past that are still relevant today. Quiet time for reflection and labyrinth walking were available during the program, with a noon-time service and lunch following.

During March we were glad to welcome four new members: Susie Thomas, Wendy Van Diver, the Rev. Nancy Holland and Shelley Rowland. Unfortunately, Susie Thomas moved to Ohio later in the spring but we are still staying in touch with her through zoom meetings, emails and phone calls.

On March 10 we were sad to learn of the passing of Margaret Fox after a long illness. She had been a beloved member of our chapter for many years. She will be fondly remembered for all she did and for her gentle, loving spirit and radiant smile.

In late March things started shutting down so we had to adapt— but we've made a concerted effort to stay in touch with each other through zoom and other means. At our chapter gatherings on zoom during the spring we completed our study and discussion of Rohr's book <u>Breathing Under Water</u>. In May we had an excellent Diocesan-wide DOK Spring Assembly on zoom led by the Rev. Janine Schenone, on the topic "Leadership of Women in Building Community During Difficult Times."

In July Pastor Jocelynn led our annual DOK chapter retreat with a presentation entitled "Making a Way in the Wilderness." She provided a very meaningful experience for all of us as we were struggling to find our way through these uncertain times. The retreat included a Noonday Prayer service.

For our August zoom chapter meeting we discussed a video about Henri Nouwen called "Journey of the Heart." In August we also had a DOK Province 8 retreat on zoom entitled "Empowered by Your Gifts."

At our monthly chapter meeting in September we started discussing a book by Henri Nouwen entitled, Following Jesus: Finding Our Way Home in an Age of Anxiety. Nouwen describes the challenges and rewards of following Jesus, then he suggests spiritual practices that can help us, including practicing the presence of God. He encourages a regular practice of prayer and service as a means to draw closer to Jesus and follow his

teaching to love one another. This fits in with our DOK commitment to practice prayer and service on a daily basis.

Also, in September we had a Diocesan-wide DOK Fall Assembly on zoom with the Rev. Susan Latimer speaking on the topic "Wisdom for Our Times with Hildegard of Bingen."

All women at St. David's are warmly invited to join our DOK chapter. They are also welcome to attend our gatherings as guests. If anyone is interested in joining the group or attending as a guest, please let us know. DOK brochures are available in the church office.

OUTREACH MINISTRIES

MINISTRIES OF COMPASSION & JUSTICE 2020

St. David's is called to show compassion (taking time to listen, give a helping hand, recognize one another as children of God) and seek justice for our neighbors far and near. Our Mission for Outreach is "to love our neighbors as ourselves by direct action in the congregation, community, and the world." St. David's has carried out this Mission over the years, even when our church burned down in 1991, did not have financial resources, or when the pandemic hit San Diego. St. David's Outreach offers many ministries and activities for our congregation to support – through time, talent, money or prayer.

The **Outreach Committee** usually meets on the 4th Tuesday of the month at 7 pm in the Library. This year was different! When all services and activities on our campus were cancelled due to COVID-19, Outreach did not meet either in person or virtually until July. Debby Park and Melinda Murdock continued to be active in the Diocesan Service & Justice Coalition. Starting in April, this group decided to meet every month by Zoom, coordinated by St. David's. These meetings have been very productive and have involved many more churches since no one needs to drive to another location to meet. Unfortunately, the Coalition has not been able to carry out their usual service projects of Maundy Thursday Community Foot Washing and Shoe Distribution nor the Back2School BackpackBash in August. We hope to resume and take on new service projects when conditions are safe.

Thanks to Committee members Roseann Myers, Melinda Murdock, Linda & Lynn Ten Eyck, Elaine Turnbull, Debby Park, Anne Kellett and Pastor Jocelynn for their input, support and service during a difficult time. The Ten Eycks and Melinda have gone off the Committee. We welcome new members.

The following is a summary of our ministries. The term "Jubilee" is included because St. David's has been a Jubilee Center of the Episcopal Church since 1984, continuing to do ministries of Compassion and Justice.

OUTREACH/JUBILEE MINISTRIES 2020

BLESSINGS IN A BAG: In the past, we would prepare Blessings in a Bag (snack bags to hand to the homeless whom we see while driving) four times a year (Feb, May, Aug, and Nov). We filled about 40 bags each time. The bags have healthy snacks, juice, water, and a prayer. This year we prepared them only on Feb. 16 before the pandemic shut us down. **Thanks to Melinda Murdock for coordinating this ministry.**

CELEBRATION OF THANKS (THANKSGIVING DINNER): Our **37th Annual Thanksgiving Day Dinner** had to be cancelled due to the pandemic.

COMMUNITY CHRISTIAN SERVICE AGENCY (CCSA): Our neighborhood emergency aid agency that St. David's helped establish over 45 years ago provides food & clothing to the needy and helps obtaining IDs & referrals to programs for which people are eligible. St. David's donates food & clothing regularly. CCSA remains open during the pandemic to provide services and food bags for clients. However, most of the CCSA activities we usually supported (annual Hunger Walk, Jr. DOK Doggy Wash, backpacks for school children, Bay Park Food Drive, and Cozy in Clairemont) had to be canceled. Many parishioners did participate in the Christmas program by donating money for gift cards for the families. During December, 120 gift cards were given to families. In Pacific Beach, 130 gift bags were given to homeless individuals. Roseann Myers serves on the CCSA Advisory Council as our parish representative.

COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS: On the third and fifth Sundays of each month, volunteers from St. David's would lead a **Vespers (Evening Prayer) service** for the patients at the San Diego County Psychiatric Hospital on South Rosecrans. We would conduct the service, sing several songs, have a short homily (or just read the Gospel), and invite prayer offerings from the patients (they often said how glad they were that we come!). We were only able to do this in January and February. After that, the facility was closed to all outside visitors and remains so. We could not even deliver Christmas cards this year. The good news is that the patients and staff have remained healthy and virus-free.

When the church was closed to outside groups due to the pandemic, we had to discontinue the in-person monthly support group for families with members who have mental illness, a program of **NAMI** (National Alliance for Mental Illness). NAMI did have a **Virtual Walk** on May 30 to raise funds.

EPISCOPAL COMMUNITY SERVICES (ECS): ECS is a non-profit that receives support from the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego. St. David's, instead of providing food for a Celebration Lunch for **CERRC (Central East Regional Recovery Center)** clients since gatherings were prohibited, provided home-baked treats, snacks, and games for clients residing at Uptown Safe Haven, a transitional housing facility for homeless individuals with mental health issues. During the pandemic, all ECS programs are being conducted virtually. For Thanksgiving and Christmas, ECS provided Thanksgiving Dinner and Christmas Dinner to Recovery Residences with our donors' support.

ECS administers Headstart programs in South Bay, ACCORD (a program to reduce driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs), and Para las Familias which gives mental health support to families, and Uptown Safe Haven. In December, we said farewell to Leslie Keller, our CEO, who led ECS to a strong financial position and vision for quality services. Roseann Myers is President of the ECS Board. Steve Turnbull, a past-Board president, is on the search committee for a new CEO. Elaine Turnbull helped plan their annual gala Making Miracles.

EPISCOPAL REFUGEE NETWORK (**REFUGEE.NET**): The Episcopal Refugee Network is an institution of the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego. Originally founded to help settle refugees already accepted by the U.S. government, the organization now focuses on providing educational and enrichment opportunities for elementary, high school and preschool age refugee children. The change is due to our government's reduction in the number of refugees allowed into the U.S. St. Luke's in North Park continues to distribute food every Thursday to refugee families. Many parishioners attended their **annual Hope Gala planned with help from Elaine Turnbull.**

EPISCOPAL RELIEF & DEVELOPMENT FUND: This fund, which was formerly the Presiding Bishop's Fund, is able to send **Relief** immediately when disasters occur in the U.S. and in any country where the Episcopal Church or partner groups have a presence. The **Development** work of ERD guides communities to lasting change with a focus on **Women** (promoting gender equality & economic stability, cultivating leaders & ending violence against women), **Children** (improving food & nutrition, protecting health & preventing disease, empowering parents) and **Climate** (providing access to clean water, hygiene & sanitation and managing environmental preparedness). We did not do an In-gathering this year to support the Fund, but we do let parishioners know when a particular need comes up so that they can contribute on their own.

FOOD PANTRY: St. David's was serving about 120 people a week at our Sunday morning Food Pantry when the pandemic struck. Coordinators Lynn and Linda Ten Eyck and the volunteers quickly adjusted to the COVID-19 guidelines issued to keep people safe – requiring masks and gloves and keeping 6 feet apart. By July, it became obvious that more changes were needed to handle the amount of food donated by stores and how it was distributed. Debby Park and Melinda Murdock helped the Coordinators research a new model and decided to shift to outside distribution with more supervision. Pastor Jocelynn helped us obtain a grant from the Diocese to purchase portable tables and shade canopies, new coolers and two new refrigerator/freezers to replace poorly functioning ones. We recruited more volunteers to help with set up and distribution. The new model began operation on Aug.30 and continued successfully to serve 45 households for the next three

months. Then the County moved into the Purple Tier (most restrictive re: COVID) and some of our volunteers contracted the virus. We had to close the Pantry for at least two weeks. We learned, however, that in order to reopen, we would need to reorganize, retrain and provide much more oversight. The Pantry has now been closed since Dec. 6, and there is still a great need for a food pantry in the Clairemont area. We are considering another model where we prepare boxes of food to give to people who have pre-registered. We would pick up from a limited number of stores on only two days with one morning for box preparation and clients having the box brought to their car. Many thanks to all the people who kept the Pantry operating during the pandemic so that people would not go hungry - Coordinators Lynn & Linda Ten Eyck, Melinda Murdock, Debby Park, Earl Peters & Peter Popa, Edna O'Grady, Sylvia Ayala& her team of sorters/organizers, Nona & Rob Lindrus, Kim Williams, Andrew McGowan & Lani Smith for their pick-up of food, and all who helped with clean up.

INTERFAITH SHELTER NETWORK: The Network is a collaborative effort by local congregations and human services agencies to provide shelter, meals, services and resources to homeless San Diegans. In early January 2020, St. David's hosted 3 single adults and 3 families with children from Jan. 11-25. We also provided a workshop on Life Management skills. Our Clairemont Branch provided 10 weeks of shelter for a total of 28 guests before the branch closed due to COVID-19. Most of the guests moved to more permanent housing, and one family was featured in the newspaper when they moved into their converted motel room/home. Many thanks to the hard workers who set up and took down the shelter and to the numerous volunteers who cooked meals and stayed overnight as hosts. We also had help from our support church Holy Cross Lutheran who provided 3 meals, overnight hosts, and monetary support, two dinners from the Islamic Center, and one from Dan Diego's Restaurant. Parishioner Kara Crawford led the guests' Life Management workshop. Jean Payne, Bob Shaw and Debby Park shared the job of Coordinator. This year (2021) the rotational shelter will house guests only in motel rooms and churches are asked to provide financial support. St. David's Vestry has just voted to allocate \$1000 to the Interfaith Shelter Network!

MILITARY FAMILIES: Although we were not worshipping in person, we did encourage parishioners to donate on May 17 – Armed Services Day - to San Diego Military Outreach Ministries which serves local active-duty enlisted military families with food, household items, baby items and furniture.

MISSION TO SEAFARERS: Due to the pandemic, we suspended collection of paperback books, greeting cards and picture magazines to give to the Stella Maris Mission to Seafarers at the 10th Ave. Marine Terminal.

PRISON MINISTRIES (COOKIES FOR KAIROS &KAIROS OUTSIDE): The cookie ministry was not allowed to take place in the prisons either in the spring or fall, nor could St. David's host the **Kairos Outside** weekend on our campus.

RACHEL'S WOMEN'S NIGHT SHELTER: Three times a month (every 2nd Wed., 4th Fri. & 4th Mon.) a team from St. David's **prepares an evening meal** for the 30 women at Rachel's Night Shelter downtown on 8th Ave between F & G streets. We fix a main dish, salad, dessert, and provide fruit, milk, and juice. This was one of the few ministries we were able to continue by dropping off the meal rather than staying to serve it (in order to protect ourselves and the women from possible exposure to COVID-19). And the women are staying healthy! Many thanks to our wonderful cooks: Sally Noorany, Jean Payne, Debby Park, Katy Finn, Melinda Murdock, Adriana Vamosiu, Harriet Carmona, Jan Bauman , Jean Hemingway, Annie Wu, Frances Warren, Ann Whalen and subs Carolyn Lief & Cathy Meagher. On Dec. 28, the 4th Monday Team again took gift bags with fun items donated by parishioners and other supporters. Many thanks to Melinda Murdock for organizing the gift bags. The women were thrilled with the gifts and always love the dinners St. David's provides.

ST. DAVID'S PRESCHOOL is an important part of our **Outreach to the neighborhood and our community**. The whole church helped support **the St. David's Festival fundraiser on Feb. 29.** For Ash Wednesday, we had parishioners & priests on hand to give ashes to preschoolers, teachers and parents. And while the school had to close initially for several months because of the pandemic, parishioners and Father Wayne helped provide chapel by Zoom to stay connected with the children.

Last, the **church regularly sponsored** 6 groups of Alcoholics Anonymous & Al-Anon who used our facility for meetings throughout the week. Unfortunately, we had to suspend all outside-group meetings as of mid-March. We hope that many of them found a way to meet virtually.

ST. DAVID'S PRESCHOOL



The beginning of 2020 found us here at the preschool working to grow our enrollment to fill our newly licensed classroom. We were making great progress on this goal and then SARS CoV-2 hit and the world was thrown into a pandemic. We make plans and God laughs....or Pandemic hits and we adjust!

Like many agencies, we closed our preschool in mid-March and realized by early April that the "temporary" shut down would be lengthier. Our teachers were put on furlough and multiple teachers expressed an interest in remaining "connected virtually". We learned how to "Zoom" and also began to conduct preschool chapel on zoom with chapel leaders Janet & Bob Shaw, Debby Park & Fr. Sanders and his daughter Joy! I kept in touch with all our families &

teachers via email, text, phone calls, FaceTime, and Zoom and even good old "snail mail"! The administrative team began to work on a plan for reopening and late spring and early summer had us with multiple projects to improve the preschool such as putting in new flooring, adding fencing downstairs to create multiple playgrounds to keep learning groups' separate, and replenishing mulch and sand that a very wet winter and spring had washed away. With the Paycheck Protection Program funding in place we were able to return our teaching staff to work in May and others returned in early June. Our plan for re-opening was approved and we re-started program operations in July. We have had three learning groups since July and are were at nearly full enrollment in the groups with 37 total enrolled children at the end of December 2020. (41 in January 2021 which makes us full for each group!)

I feel very fortunate for us here at St. David's Preschool as it is projected that 60% of businesses that closed in this country during the pandemic never reopened. (CNBC-Yelp survey) This also includes Non-Profit programs. Our treasurer and I set a goal early on that we would work hard to make sure that St. David's Episcopal Church & Preschool would be among the 40% that "make it through"! The many "requirements and recommendations" have forced us to make major changes in our procedures and staffing pattern which quite bluntly is **more costly**. However, we have continued to keep a close eye on spending and have looked at areas for cutbacks and areas where it is just not possible to cutback. We have also been very fortunate in that the preschool was eligible for grant funding in excess of \$15,000 this year which helped us survive. I am very appreciative that the diocese had the foresight to connect all Episcopal schools in the San Diego Diocese with

the Los Angeles Diocese Consortium of Schools. We have gotten much support both in hygiene supplies and more importantly timely information and technical support!

The pandemic has also had an impact on our staff and support staff. Unfortunately, Ms. Michelle Lazarone and Ms. Dina Madruga left us this year and returned to their home states of Colorado and New Mexico as the cost of living and part time work was just not viable any longer. We are sad to lose such vibrant and dedicated women due to moving. We have also had COVID-19 hit within the preschool community. We have had four families of children/staff have someone test positive. Thankfully timelines of exposures were such that we were not required to close program operations and those families have quarantined as required and experienced relatively mild symptoms. It was decided in November that we would also have children mask while inside at school even though this is not a requirement but a recommendation. The older 3, 4 and 5 year olds are pretty compliant and we work on improving the skills and increasing time wearing a mask with the younger 3 year olds.

I wish to express my appreciation for the many layers of support that I receive from the St. David's Community. I do talk with other "church" preschool directors and I am keenly aware that not all churches provide the support or work as a team. Of course I could not do any of this work without the powerful energetic teaching team--kudos to Zyntia, Nikki, Cindy, Stephanie, & Anna and substitutes Jamie & Melissa for working in the face of adversity for the love of Christ and children! Treena Roman is my day to day support person be it giving a break to a staff member, looking up information or contacting an agency. She wears many hats and I appreciate her "can do" positive attitude! Thank you to the entire Preschool Advisory Committee (PAC) and for your support over this very different year! We were able to plan several physically distanced events such as Graduation 2020 and our Pumpkin Patch because of their dedication! Thank you to the Vestry who has always been supportive of the preschool program and particularly ministers to me as a person. I especially appreciate the extra time the executive committee spends with me keeping in touch weekly be it about finances, facility or just checking in on us all. I especially want to acknowledge the support

I receive from Pastor Jocelynn. Even though she is across the state, she is very available for regular support of me as your director, of the teaching staff & parents as they request it, and of the children via our weekly chapel program on Zoom.

So where are we headed in 2021? While the first quarter will still be one of keeping a close eye fiscally, we look forward to filling a new fourth learning group for early 2021. Hopefully this will put us on a positive track in the Profit & Loss report but more importantly will allow us to outreach and minister to more young children and families. Additionally, there is hope that in the near future our preschool staff can be immunized as those in the Childcare & Education sector are in line right behind medical and emergency personnel to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

Facility Use (Campus)

Prior to the Pandemic shut down in March 2020, our beautiful campus and buildings were in full use by the many groups that we have hosted over the years. However, since then, only two groups have been allowed on campus.

The Food Pantry continued to operate weekly, with masks and social distancing. In the Fall, the Bishop directed them to move outside for Sunday distribution. In spite of precautions, by December, 8 members of the volunteer team tested positive for COVID 19. The Vestry made the difficult decision to put this ministry on pause until further notice.

When the Preschool was able to reopen in July, it was determined by the Vestry that the Mission Center and the new classroom upstairs would be the better venue than downstairs. The Mission Center has air conditioning, heating and super air filters to promote more comfortable and safer spaces. Also, due to the requirements of the Pandemic it allowed separate rooms and bathroom facilities for the teachers and students. This will continue into the foreseeable future. The downstairs rooms received new flooring and paint and even though we had another flood from the upstairs, it is back in good condition.

The playground also received upgrades and has been divided into separate areas for keeping classes safe. Director Karen Garcia is planning to begin using two of the downstairs rooms for an additional classroom by Fall.

Facility Maintenance (Jr. Warden Report)

This has been a year like no other, but our campus at St David's Episcopal Church and Preschool is a place that continues to serve our members (although virtually), preschool children and neighbors. We have had several facility and grounds work completed this year:

- Leak from janitor closet/food pantry in Ed Center into Preschool below. Case of toilet paper soaked, ceiling tiles damaged (replaced by David Priest). (March 2020)
- Library and administrative offices roof replaced by Diamond Roofing (March 2020)
- Trees removed (large pine at entrance to July St lot, large Schefflera in Memorial garden with disruptive roots), trees trimmed including eucalyptus, orchid trees, olive trees, acacia stenophylla (next to library) completed June 2020
- Milton St. Parking lot resealed and striped by Joe's Paving (May 2020)
- Rector's office ceiling and wall repaired (damaged by leak in roof in 2019) Repair done May 2020
- Preschool playground improvements (June 2020)
- Code lock installed to Mission center prior to Preschool reopening, work performed by Grah Lock
- Preschool rooms painted and new flooring installed (summer 2020)
- Preschool screened/locking doors installed (summer 2020)
- New door installed at SDGE/Electrical room by Jessie Wright of Fenrir Construction (August 2020)
- Cell tower construction to add a Verizon tower to the T-Mobile tower (construction started September 2020). Included new set of steps from July St.

- Leak (2nd time in 2020) from janitor closet/food pantry into several preschool rooms and upstairs bathrooms in Education Center causing more than \$25,000 damage. Flood occurred October with several weeks of construction that followed.
- Freezer in Mission center stopped working

Just a reminder, the campus remains closed because of the pandemic. This is necessary to avoid spreading the virus and keep our staff and preschool as safe as possible.

In 2020 the Stewardship Committee working with the Vestry began year three of our plan (2017-2019), continuing our theme, Growing in Faith, Gratitude, and Generosity.

- During **January** and **February**, plans for the year were developed, including a Parish Lenten study, to support the Preschool 30th Anniversary Celebration and a Fall Homecoming; In **March**, we partnered with our Preschool families and staff to celebrate **St. David's Day with a Festival**. *Then we went on lockdown*.
- Stewardship during the pandemic required us to take a new perspective.

 Arundhati Roy wrote, "Whatever it is, coronavirus had made the mighty kneel and brought the world to a halt like nothing else." St. David's faced changing how we worship, gather, minister and function financially.
- For the season of **Lent**, we continued our **Daily Generosity Challenge** and had new daily **Lenten Meditations.**
- On April 23^{rd,} we welcomed our new Rector, Pastor Jocelyn.
- In **September**, the Stewardship Team met with Pastor Jocelynn to develop our Fall program. The theme was **Creating Sacred Spaces** and we started reading the all-parish book, *An Altar in the World* by Barbara Brown Taylor. During our ZOOM Coffee Hour, we had a lively group discussion of this book.
- In **October**, we launched the 2021 **Annual Pledge Drive** with a goal of \$220,000. Pledging households received their information packets in a reusable Saint David's bag with a magnet and small candle, which could be used on Sunday mornings as we worship together. On **Consecration Sunday**, we gathered pledges via a drive-through/drop-off in the church parking lot. Both occasions allowed the Vestry and stewardship members to visit with parishioners in person (socially distanced and with masks, of course).
- Thanks to our parishioners, our pledge drive currently has 52 pledgers for a total of almost \$220,000.

THE ROLE OF TREASURER

2020 SUMMARY - Church only

The Treasurer is in charge of monthly reporting to the Vestry and Congregation all income and expenses in a clear and comprehensible way. Other duties include financial analysis, annual budgeting, strategic planning, and revenue/expense management. Most importantly, the Treasurer works with the Finance Committee to analyze all relevant information and make informed recommendations to the Vestry for current needs and future possibilities. I took over as Treasurer in May of 2013. I am pleased to bring my education and skills to this position and serve St. David's in this capacity.

2020 INCOME AND EXPENSE S vs. 2019 INCOME AND EXPENSES (Church Only)

2020 ended with a **net positive income for the church of \$9,587**. The balance in the Operating Accounts at year-end was \$94,284. The balance in the Endowment Funds on 12/31/2020 was \$44,732.

2020 IN REVIEW:

Where do I begin...

- 1. The Rector 2020 began with the exciting news of hiring Pastor Jocelynn Hughes as our full time Rector in January. Due to her school and family commitments, the plan was to have her commute from Sacramento to San Diego on weekends starting in April and then move her family down by July of 2020. However, with the onset of the coronavirus in March this plan fell apart and the Vestry had to grapple with this new situation.
- 2. The Coronavirus Within weeks of hiring our new rector, the coronavirus situation prompted the Vestry to close the church campus and preschool. The Vestry met weekly to review information and make ongoing decisions. Preschool teachers were furloughed (time off without pay) and church staff was reduced to 50% in order to preserve cash. Pastor Jocelynn immediately started online programming (weekly prayer services, happy hour, bible study) and Sunday worship on Facebook Live. After receiving the paycheck protection program (PPP) money in May of \$108,396 (a forgivable federal loan) plans were made to re-open the preschool. Due to health requirements, two preschool classrooms were opened in the Mission Center and one in the Education Building. The preschool re-opened July 6, 2020. On-line services continued with the hope that we could re-gather. Unfortunately, the coronavirus situation continues and we are still unable to gather together. At the end of 2020, all worship and prayer services continued on-line and Pastor Jocelynn and family remained in Sacramento with the hopes of being able to move to San Diego sometime in 2021.

3. The Campus Needs Assessment – if you recall, at the 2020 Annual Meeting, we kicked off a "Caring for Our Campus" campaign. This campaign was going to address the Property Assessment completed in April of 2019. A thorough examination was conducted of all 2.19 acres that makes up the campus of St. David's Church & Preschool including: all four buildings (Sanctuary/Library/Office Bldg; Education Bldg; Mission Center and Rectory) parking lots and landscape. The report details the current condition and needs of the buildings and property. Total projected costs: \$230,000 for everything from new roofs, new HVAC systems, landscape issues, rectory repairs, parking lot upgrades and overall painting of walls and wood trim. While this seems a daunting task, the Finance Committee and Vestry got to work and completed the recommended Life Safety and Short-Term issues in 2019 including: repairing the electrical system at the Rectory (\$3,700) removing a tree at the rectory whose roots were damaging the driveway and garage slab (\$1,800) repairing the cracked slab at the rectory (\$2,000). In 2020, the Library/Office Bldg. roof was replaced (\$18,800), the upper parking lot repaved (\$5,275), trees removed and/or trimmed around campus (\$5,000), and the electrical room door replaced (\$1,650). The Finance Committee will continue to see what projects from the Property Assessment can be completed in 2021 with replacement of the Sanctuary roof being a high priority.

ENDOWMENT FUND UPDATE

St. David's Perpetual Endowment Fund (the Fund) was created in 1989 and according to the Fund Charter "was established to provide a permanent, inflation adjusted investment base to generate earnings for use in St. David's Operating Fund." The Fund consists of two managed investment accounts: 1) T. Rowe Price Equity Income Fund with the objective to "seek a high level of dividend income and long-term capital growth primarily through investments in stocks" (balance on 12/31/2020: \$30,504) and 2) Dodge & Cox Stock Fund with the objective to seek long-term growth of principal and income by primarily investing in a diversified portfolio of equity securities" (balance on 12/31/2020: \$14,228).

Each year the Treasurer is responsible for calculating the minimum asset base according to instructions in the Fund Charter. In 2020 we left the restricted (base) amount at \$43,998, the amount set in 2019 as no new gifts had been added in 2019. If the value of the Fund is above the base, the Vestry may use it to supplement the Operating Fund. If the Fund falls below the base amount, the Vestry must wait for the value to rise above the base. In February of 2020, the Vestry voted to sell \$5,000 worth of shares for "repairs and improvements." However, due to a decline in the stock markets, we had to wait until December of 2020 to follow through on the Vestry motion.

Another investment fund was started by Bishop Mathes for St. David's (and each congregation in the Diocese) in 2013. This fund is a mutual fund managed through the Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT) and currently has a value of \$261. This fund is also available to use for gifts and savings. The Stewardship Committee will assist the Vestry in educating the parish about all of the available ways to save for St. David's future.

2021 LOOKING AHEAD

Total pledge amounts increased in 2021 to \$209,274 from the 2020 amount of \$206,972. Pledging units increased by 1, to 54 in 2021 from 53 in 2020. The Finance Committee and Vestry have worked hard to secure a diversification of income including: \$3,600 monthly rent from the rectory (\$43,200/yr); \$2,500 monthly facilities fee from the preschool (\$30,000/yr); and \$3,113 monthly rent from Verizon for the cell tower (\$37,2680/yr). The 2021 Budget includes 3% raises for the Parish Administrator and Music Director, with a small and manageable projected deficit of (\$2,281). We are approaching 2021 with caution: the coronavirus is still uncontained; we need to bring Pastor Jocelynn and family to San Diego from Sacramento in a very challenging housing market; and we may not be able to re-gather at church until very late in the year. Amidst all these challenges, I know God is with us and I look forward to helping us successfully manage our way through it all.
